


**BEWARE

# What it's all about

Imagine a herd of 40 rhinos on skateboards cruising through the middle of the Gold Coast. Now imagine driving your car out in front of them.


## Pretty dangerous, right?

One G:link tram weighs as much as 40 rhinos and is just as difficult to stop. In fact in an emergency stop, it can take 42.5 metres to stop a tram travelling at 60km/h - that's more than 9 car lengths.

In an emergency stop, the tram might not hit you, but the force of the sudden brake may injure those on board.

The road rules haven't changed with the introduction of trams on the Gold Coast, but it's important to follow the road rules to prevent avoidable incidents and injuries. Follow the tips in this brochure to keep everyone safe.

Keep an eye out for new traffic signs around the city.



'T' traffic lights are for trams only. You don't have to stop on a red 'T'.



# 5 tips for driving near the light rail

1

Only perform u-turns at signalised intersections with the u-turn permitted sign.

2

Look over your shoulder before crossing the tracks as trams can approach from behind.

3

Keep tracks clear. Don't queue across tracks or stop on the crosshatch markings.

4

Remember that tracks are for trams. Only drive over the tracks where directed to do so (e.g. at intersections).

5

Always look out for trams while driving near the tracks.
